From the Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,



Last month at the Chum fall assembly, Lisa Harper from Washington D.C. spoke about *shalom*, and its implications for public policy and our life together. She unpacked the concept of shalom with three other words from Genesis. First was the word *good* – which God announces of creation at the beginning, it was *very good* – it was overflowing, abundantly, forcefully good, she said. And goodness here meant not that good resided in a thing itself, but in Hebrew that *good existed between things*; the relationships between all parts of creation are very good, God says, working together holistically to bless the whole creation.

We kept that in mind with the second and third terms she described – *image of God* and *dominion*. Being created in the image, or literally the *icon*, of God, she said means humans are created to be *markers of where God rules*, in contrast to where other rulers oppress. We are given dominion in the same breath as we are made in the image of God. And that word dominion in Hebrew did not mean not governmental rule, not "treading down" others, she said, but *tending the good, maintaining the wellness of the relationships between things*.

I used to dislike that word dominion, but Lisa Harper helped deepen its meaning for me. Dominion was not only like stewardship but it meant *exercising agency in God's image* – and every human being is created to do so, she said. To be human is to exercise dominion, agency that reflects God's image. But the problem is – and here's the connection with Chum – that *poverty and oppression shrink the capacity of some people to exercise their agency*, their dominion, to lead, to create, to dream and pursue that dream, she said. Poverty and oppression minimize the image of God on earth, she said, the capacity for people to live to their full potential, to exercise agency as bearers of God's image. And when shalom is absent, Lisa Harper asked us, how can we as people of faith push policy leaders to honor the image of God?

Our world continues to suffer from terrorism, oppression, and suspicion of others. Our own lives are not immune to hurts and burdens. But with the coming of Jesus the Messiah, Isaiah and other prophets reveal how God is ending the cycle of violence and restoring wholeness to the world through his Son, whose compassion and justice truly reflect God's image. His name is *prince of shalom* – the reconciler of the goodness of all relationships.

The promised shalom in the birth of the Messiah characterizes our Advent

journey toward Christmas this month:

- + Dec 5, the Gustavus Adolphus College Choir concert is streamed live at Gloria Dei beginning at 7:15 pm; its theme is *Shalom, Salaam, Peace* in this world.
- + Dec 13, the story of Santa Lucia is told during coffee hour, a story of light in the darkness and compassion for the needy all children are invited to be part of the procession.
- + Dec 20, the Sunday School tells the Christmas gospel in word and song during worship.
- + Dec 24 at 12:00 noon, we gather with Chum at the city hall steps in vigil to remember the homeless.
- + Dec 24 at 5:00 and 10:00 pm, we worship at Christmas Eve and welcome the Christ Child.
- + All month, there are opportunities to participate in God's reconciling work through special giving this season (see p. 10 & 14).

Forerunners and messengers advance the advent of our God. While John the Baptizer's voice in the wilderness may be the principal focus of the day, Malachi's prophesy could as easily herald the coming Lord Jesus as forerunner of the Lord of hosts. Finally all the baptized are called to participate in the sharing of the gospel. In so doing we prepare the way for the coming of the Lord and assist all flesh in capturing a vision of the "salvation of God."

Sunday, December 13, 2015 Third Sunday of Advent

In the familiar account of Christ's birth, the evening sky is bright with the heavenly host singing, "Glory to God in the highest." Amid our broken world we proclaim that the prince of peace is born among us. God comes to us in human flesh—in Christ's body and blood—so that we may be bearers of divine light to all the world. Gloria Dei Renovation Update

The Renovation Committee is recommending a three-phase plan for the Hillside Room Renovation. We gathered feedback from the congregation and hired a mechanical/electrical/plumbing/engineering consultant to provide us with an assessment of our existing systems. Subsequently we hired a professional architect to assist us with schematic cost estimates for building construction. With this additional information our committee reflected on priorities in regard to key focal points of Gloria Dei's mission: "Striving to be inclusive in serving the community". We measured the financial implications of the project and created a plan to accomplish our renovation goals within realistic budget expectations.

Phase 1 includes new front's entry steps, waterproofing the north wall, building a Hillside Room addition, and relocating the toilet rooms into that addition. Phase 2A includes the kitchen remodeling along with equipment upgrades. Phase2B involves the remodeling of the Hillside Room.

We will be recommending this renovation plan to the Council and congregation and initiating a subcommittee to address the funding of this project. Sue Anderson has volunteered to chair this fundraising committee.

You will be receiving a letter from Pastor David that provides a more detailed summary of the plan including a floor plan and cost estimates. Please keep our project in your prayers. Feel free to ask questions of me or any of the renovation committee members: Brett Amundson, Gary Olson, Terri Erickson, Carol Kelley, Carol Uecker, Bob Hewitt, Sue Anderson, John McDonald, and Karen Kjolhaug.

WELCOMING MINISTRIES OF GLORIA DEI

Welcoming Ministries provides affirmation and support for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ) persons and allies both in our church family and in the community. We work together with RIC (Reconciling in Christ) and ReconcilingWorks (formerly Lutherans Concerned) efforts within the congregation and Lutheran community. Welcoming Ministries helps organize Gloria Dei's annual RIC Sunday and serves as a resource for other congregations and individuals. We meet one Sunday a month following worship. All supportive people are invited to join us.

Gloria Dei has been an officially welcoming and affirming congregation since the 1990s. Within the Lutheran community, it was the first RIC congregation in the Northeastern Minnesota Synod, welcoming LGBTQ persons into all aspects of ministry and leadership, and establishing a chapter for Lutherans Concerned North America (now called ReconcilingWorks). Welcoming Ministries also provides meeting space for supportive groups and works with other inclusive efforts in the community.

LSS Together for Youth, a support group for LGBTQ teens ages 14-20, meets weekly at Gloria Dei, and Northland LGBT Elders meets monthly at Gloria Dei. The Gay Men's Center has had an office at Gloria Dei for the past 18 months.

We are currently entering into a partnership with the Northland LGBT Elders and the Northland Gay Men's Center to establish the Northland LGBT Resource Center here at Gloria Dei. We will keep you updated as those plans evolve.

Even now with the changes in marriage laws and inclusive policy changes within the ELCA, there is still a need to educate and advocate on behalf of LGBT people within the church and in the broader community. Gloria Dei's Welcoming Ministries will continue to be a resource to other congregations, promote inclusive policies within ELCA, and serve as ambassadors to the LGBT community.
