From the Pastor

Dear friends in Christ,



It was December 1967 when Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. preached his last Christmas sermon, at Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta. Its main theme, taken from the angel host's proclamation, "peace on earth, goodwill toward all," spoke to people in the throes of the Vietnam War and the struggle for civil rights, and called for the development of what he called a "world perspective" that sees the interrelatedness of all people and all life. In our own time impacted by polarization, pandemic, and climate change, and still marked by racial inequity, I invite you to consider how excerpts from his Christmas message continue to resonate today:

This Christmas season finds us a rather bewildered human race. We have neither peace within nor peace without. Everywhere paralyzing fears harrow people by day and haunt them by night. Our world is sick with war; everywhere we turn we see its ominous possibilities. And yet, my friends, the Christmas hope for peace and goodwill toward all men [sic] can no longer be dismissed as a kind of pious dream of some utopian. If we don't have goodwill toward men in this world, we will destroy ourselves by the misuse of our own instruments and our own power. ...

[I]f we are to have peace on earth, our loyalties must become ecumenical rather than sectional. Our loyalties must transcend our race, our tribe, our class, and our nation; and this means we must develop a world perspective. No individual can live alone, and as long as we try, the more we are going to have war in this world. Now the judgment of God is upon us, and we must either learn to live together as brothers or we are all going to perish together as fools.

Yes, as nations and individuals, we are interdependent. I have spoken to you before of our visit to India some years ago. It was a marvelous experience; but I say to you this morning that there were those depressing moments. How can one avoid being depressed when one sees with one's own eyes evidences of millions of people going to bed hungry at night? How can one avoid being depressed when one sees with one's own eyes thousands of people sleeping on the sidewalks at night? ...

It really boils down to this: that all life is interrelated. We are all caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied into a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly. We are made to live together because of the interrelated structure of reality. ...

Dr. King went on to affirm that it is *God's love* that enables peace on earth to come about, God's self-giving love revealed in Christ's birth and life and also in his death and resurrection, God's agape love that enables us to see our interrelatedness and work toward a shared future of mutual flourishing.

As we begin a new year, I give thanks for ways in which God is shaping our ministry toward *deeper interrelatedness*. Despite the isolating effects of the pandemic, I am grateful for ways we are finding to "be" together as a parish through Coffee Hour, Life Groups, Bible studies, men's and women's groups. Last month, a group organized by our Health Cabinet visited one of our members through her nursing home picture window, bringing signs and waving, and praying for her. Our Health Coordinator Kristen has also organized virtual FaceTime visits, sent cards, and coordinated phone calls and check-ins to help keep homebound members connected.

I'm also thankful for efforts to recognize and cultivate deeper *interrelatedness with others in the community*. This includes people experiencing poverty and homelessness through Chum, LSS, and Loaves & Fishes. It also includes newer relationships with Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) leaders and organizations. Last month, a small team from our Men in Mission group met with the director of the Family Freedom Center, Kevin Alexander, to hear about his vision for the well being of African Americans in Duluth and how Gloria Dei can begin a relationship as a supportive ally. This month, we are hosting an important film and discussion about racial justice January 13 facilitated by Daniel Oyinloye called "Intergenerational Conversations" (see p. ** for information to register). As we have been learning in our racial justice book discussions, recognizing racial inequity and injustices can be uncomfortable, but it is necessary for healing and building relational capacity.

Finally, I am encouraged by attention to a deeper *interrelatedness with all life*. This includes involvement with our gardens and Green Team, Minnesota Interfaith Power & Light, an ongoing Earth Harmony book discussion, and our synod's Ecofaith Network. This month, one of our adult forums will focus on how to talk with children about climate change. And the "Called to Arise" workshop series, with short films and articles on the intersection of racism, inequality, and the environment continues on January 19 with Prof. Diane Jacobson of Luther Seminary reflecting biblically on the Earth Day jubilee.

In a film of that series just released about the *Incarnation*, I observed: "Nativity scenes are not complete without a starlit sky, without migrant seekers from other lands, or without animals, who both witness the birth of Christ and share in his salvation. For as in Bethlehem, so too among us, the eternal Word that became flesh embraces not just a human life but all the elements of the universe, in order to redeem it all." May the *world perspective* of Dr. King, rooted in God's all-encompassing love, broaden our vision and inspire us toward deeper interrelatedness, that we may reflect the peace on earth Christ came to bring.



Sunday, January 3, 2021 Second Sunday of Christmas

Within the gospel reading's profound words lies the simple message that God is revealed in a human person. Though we may try to understand how the Word existed with God from the beginning of time, the wonder we celebrate at Christmas is that the Word continues to dwell among us. Christ comes among us in the gathered assembly, the scriptures, the waters of new birth, and the bread and the wine. Through these ordinary gifts we receive the fullness of God's grace and truth.

Jeremiah 31:7-14, Psalm 147:12-20, Ephesians 1:3-14, John 1:[1-9] 10-18

Sunday, January 10, 2021 Baptism of Our Lord

Our re-creation in baptism is an image of the Genesis creation, where the Spirit of God moved over the waters. Both Mark's gospel and the story in Acts make clear that it is the Spirit's movement that distinguishes Jesus' baptism from John's. The Spirit has come upon us as upon Jesus and the Ephesians, calling us God's beloved children and setting us on Jesus' mission to re-create the world in the image of God's vision of justice and peace.

Genesis 1:1-5, Psalm 29, Acts 19:1-7, Mark 1:4-11

Sunday, January 17, 2021 Second Sunday after Epiphany

All the baptized have a calling in God's world. God calls not just pastors and deacons but also the youngest child, like Samuel. The story of the calling of Nathanael plays with the idea of place. Nathanael initially dismisses Jesus because he comes from Nazareth. But where we come from isn't important; it's where—or rather whom—we come to. Jesus refers to Jacob, who had a vision in a place he called "the house of God, and . . . the gate of heaven" (Gen. 28:17). Jesus says he himself is the place where Nathanael will meet God. 1 Samuel 3:1-10 [11-20], Psalm 139:1-6, 13-18, 1 Corinthians 6:12-20, John 1:43-51

Sunday, January 24, 2021 Third Sunday after Epiphany

As we continue through the time after Epiphany, stories of the call to discipleship show us the implications of our baptismal calling to show Christ to the world. Jesus begins proclaiming the good news and calling people to repentance right after John the Baptist is arrested for preaching in a similar way. Knowing that John was later executed, we see at the very outset the cost of discipleship. Still, the two sets of brothers leave everything they have known and worked for all their lives to follow Jesus and fish for people.

Jonah 3:1-5, 10, Psalm 62:5-12, 1 Corinthians 7:29-31, Mark 1:14-20

Sunday, January 31, 2021 Fourth Sunday after Epiphany

In Deuteronomy God promises to raise up a prophet like Moses, who will speak for God; in Psalm 111 God shows the people the power of God's works. For the church these are ways of pointing to the unique authority people sensed in Jesus' actions and words. We encounter that authority in God's word, around which we gather, the word that prevails over any lesser spirit that would claim power over us, freeing us to follow Jesus.

The Annual Report includes reports from committees and ministries, nominations for Council, and the 2021 Budget. Due to Covid-19, the office plans to mail reports so they arrive at least ten days ahead of the meeting, which will convene at 10:00 a.m. Sunday, January 31, and resume after worship on Zoom through the usual coffee hour link. Please read and bring your reports to the meeting. This meeting will also include a verbal updates.

SAFE GATHERING TEAM – JANUARY 2021

We are facing a difficult winter—the reality of a third and most severe surge in the spread of COVID-19 while at the same time the hope for better days to come with the approval of one or more safe and effective vaccines. It would be tempting to give in to "covid-fatigue" in our eagerness to get back to



"normal." One health care expert has spoken of this as "our darkest winter."

In December the Safe Gathering Team has paid particular attention to news that has come from the Minnesota Department of Health. The data has made clear that Minnesota is seeing its highest rates of infection, hospitalizations and intensive care unit admissions, and deaths, numbers that exceed the worst points of the surges in April and May. This has reinforced our determination that now is not the time to move toward any further level of reopening.

We are encouraged by the news of approved COVID-19 vaccines and Minnesota's preparations for distribution, including in the Duluth area. Minnesota will follow the recommendations of the CDC in determining priority groups who should receive the early limited doses. Ultimately, all Minnesotans will have an opportunity to be vaccinated. It will not be required or mandated, but it is highly encouraged.

The SGT joins in encouraging vaccination when it becomes available but we also know it will take months before we have reached a point when we can stop doing the things we have been doing for the past 10 months to slow the spread—wear masks, stay 6 feet from others, wash hands often, and stay home if sick.

The report of the SGT in the 2020 Annual Report includes the current phase of our Safe Gathering Plan and a general idea of what might be possible in the future. Meanwhile, we thank you for your patience and your continuing support, not only of our work but of the ministry of Gloria Dei.

REBUILDING + RENEWING THRU NOV 2020

At the end of November, Gloria Dei had a total revenue balance on hand of \$212,678 with total projected expenses of \$219,170 including the organ, for a balance needed of \$6,492. If all out-



standing campaign pledges of \$29,500 are received, this will surpass projected expenses by \$23,008. Thank you for your faithful and generous giving!

JANUARY 2021 EARTH STEWARDSHIP TIPS

- Conserving and sharing a finite planet: "President Biden's chief of staff and Office of Management and Budget director should align all federal agencies, spending, and legislative strategy around four big goals: ending the pandemic, dismantling systemic racism, confronting climate change, and "Redirecting the Economy Toward Community, the Environment, and a Sustainable Future."
- Changing course: "Under Biden, the Department of Justice can reverse course and argue in favor of the defendants in <u>Juliana v. United States</u>, the constitutional climate recovery lawsuit brought by 21 young Americans against the U.S. government. (Trump's DOJ argued the Constitution does not give youth access to the courts to protect their environmental rights.)"
- Banking on fossil fuels?: "Since 2016, the world's top 35 banks have undermined the Paris Agreement by providing \$2.7 trillion to the fossil fuel industry. President Biden should appoint a Treasury secretary, SEC chair, and financial regulators at all levels of his administration who are committed to holding financial institutions accountable for climate risk."
- Coming clean: "The Biden administration needs to establish mandatory, consistent, industry-wide, corporate climate risk disclosure.
 This would send a clear signal across every sector of the economy that mitigating climate risk is critical to the financial stability of our country. The old adage is true: what gets measured gets managed."
- Paying all the costs: "Carbon must be priced appropriately to pay
 its full costs of polluting the planet," said <u>Janet Yellen</u>, former Chair
 of the Federal Reserve System. "It will certainly affect the economics of fracking and coal—the idea is to drive that stuff out of business over time. Maybe it doesn't sound pleasant to say, but that's
 what has to happen."
